Library faculty provide search expertise, are available to answer your questions at the reference desk between 8 am and 5 pm weekdays(531-8634) or via email (herref@hmc.psu.edu), and provide customized instruction and workshops to help empower you to find the information you need, when and where you need it. The Harrell HSL also has 28 public access computers available for your use as well as recently renovated quiet and group study space on both the first and second floors. We invite you to stop in and take advantage of our expertise, extensive collections, updated space, and of course, just to say hello!

Resource Highlights

Zotero: Free Open Source Option for Managing Your Citations

Looking for an alternative to EndNote or RefWorks? Zotero is an option to consider. It's an easy to use, accessible, free resource with many of the same features as EndNote and RefWorks. It will also import citations from other citation managers, which makes it relatively easy to make the switch.

One of the advantages of Zotero, in addition to its price, is that your citations are available from any Firefox browser, on any machine

on which you download the Zotero software. No more downloading your citations on a thumb drive to carry from machine to machine. Plus, unlike RefWorks, Zotero allows you to have a long-term relationship with your citations; they'll still be there after your time at Penn State with no exporting or software purchases necessary.

In addition to these advantages, Zotero offers features such as: ability to save a citation directly from a web-

site, PDF, or using a unique identifier such as DOI; integration with Word; and collaborative tools so that you can share your references with others and collaboratively build bibliographies.

How Do I?

ILLiad for Interlibrary Loan – More Tips You Can Use

We continue to provide one more episode of “tips” to ensure a smooth implementation of ILLiad at the Hershey campus. We have heard from many satisfied customers, and hope that your experience is a good one. Let us hear from you at hmcill@hmc.psu.edu or x8633.

Copyright – It's the law, and quite complicated!

In a nutshell, copyright laws govern the amount of material each Library is permitted to borrow on behalf of its users. This is calculated on an annual basis per journal title. When the limit is reached (usually towards the end of the calendar year), a royalty fee will be charged for additional copies. These fees vary greatly, from \$.05 per page to \$45.00 per article or more. This is especially difficult with journal issues that focus on a particular topic, from which one may want to obtain multiple articles. In those instances, an attempt will be made to borrow the publication.

When requesting for items to be scanned from our print resources, we are also limited to a single chapter from a textbook and a single article from a journal issue per instance. We do not keep track of requests made at different times.

Loans

Libraries that lend print materials to us dictate the loan period, the condition of use (for example, some may stipulate “in library use only”), and whether renewals would be granted. Since it is a privilege to be able to borrow from another library's collection, it is important that we abide by their rules, use the material with utmost care, and return them promptly. If a renewal is necessary, such request should be made before the actual due date for processing. This can be done in your ILLiad account, or by calling the ILL office (x8633).

Expiration Dates

Articles that are obtained and delivered to your ILLiad account will be available for access for approximately 30 days. Copyright law (again!!) prohibits us from leaving them in the server indefinitely. Please print or store your documents within that timeframe. If you inadvertently delete an article, we may be able to retrieve it before the system purges the files. Contact us if that happens.

We enjoy hearing from you and knowing how ILLiad is serving your needs!

Patent and Trademark Information from the Library

Intellectual property has become a key asset in the information age, and the protection of IP through patents and trademarks continues to grow in importance. Through the Patent and Trademark Depository Library Program, the Penn State University Libraries offer assistance to faculty, students, and researchers along with independent inventors throughout Pennsylvania. The physical collection resides in the Physical and Mathematical Sciences Library on the University Park campus, but digital access and assistance are available throughout the Commonwealth. Librarians and staff are trained to assist you in locating basic information about patents and to provide referrals to experts within the libraries for more detail inquiries. The Libraries website provides a research guide to patent and trademark information with links to the many websites and related government information portals.

Beyond those seeking intellectual property protection, there is a wealth of technical, historical, and genealogical information to be discovered in patents and trademarks. For example, the first U.S. patent ever issued went to Samuel Hopkins of Philadelphia, PA on July 31, 1790 for "the making of Pot ash and Pearl ash by a new Apparatus and Process." Even closer to home, William S. Pierce and James H. Donachy received a patent in 1980 for a "Blood pump and method of pumping blood", more famously known as the Penn State Heart-Assist Pump.

PSH WiFi REMINDER

Full-text Journal articles via PubMed

Retrieving full-text articles from your search in Pubmed is easy. Follow this easy guide and in no time you will have your journal articles.

1. **Always link to PubMed via the George T. Harrell Health Sciences Library's Web site** (<http://med.psu.edu/library>) located under Quick Links on the left side of the Web page. This PubMed URL specifically defines Penn State Hershey patrons coming to PubMed and thus enables links to Hershey subscribed and freely accessible journal articles that are linked from citations via LinkOut. Please do not resort to finding PubMed via Google—You will not have access to all the full-text articles licensed by the Harrell HSL.
2. When you get your results—the PubMed default is to present the citations in abbreviated format. Change the 'Display Settings' from Summary to Abstract. Browse your citations then look for the Penn State Hershey symbol (see image below). In the example below, one of the symbols leads users to the volumes and issues available on the shelves in the library. The other symbol will take the user to the full-text article. (See image on page 5)
3. If a Penn State LinkOut icon is not available in the citation, double check the [AtoZ List](#) and if the journal title is still not listed, you may submit an Interlibrary Loan (ILL). Please see the @Harrell.Lib volume 1 issues 2-4 (<http://med.psu.edu/web/library/home/librarynews>) for quick and easy steps to doing an ILL or simply call the ILL Dept. at x8633 or x8759 for assistance with ILLiad. 
